## "Transnational\_History\_Lab" Program

Dates: Monday, 5. February to Saturday, 10. February 2024

## **Description of formats:**

- Workshops: For each junior scholar's paper, a total of 45 minutes is allotted. The
  participants are given 5-10 minutes to present their papers, followed by a discussion of
  around 35 minutes. For each presentation, a junior scholar will be appointed to give first
  comments alongside the senior scholar. After the assigned junior and senior researcher
  have presented their feedback, the floor will be opened for the rest of the group. There is a
  10-minute break following each presentation.
- Walk-and-talk: 1-2 senior scholars are paired with junior scholars to talk a walk and
  discuss a specific topic. Care will be taken to combine scholars across the main themes of
  the winter school to ensure new contacts.
- Practical experiences from research groups: Different research groups with knowledge
  on transnational history are represented at the winter school. These groups will be given
  the opportunity to present their on-going projects and share their experiences.
- Group work on policy presentation and research contributions: Each group (to be determined at the winter school) will be given the task to collectively present how their research will contribute to "Researching research" agenda as well as to prepare short policy briefings. The groups will be asked to answer key questions like: how does their specific theme relate to current societal debates? What are the implications of their research? What are the contributions of their presentations both to research and other potential benefactors?

During the presentation round on Friday 9. February, each group will be given 10 minutes to concisely present their findings to the other participants of the Winter School. A round of rapid-fire questions will then follow from both the junior and senior scholars. This will test the presentation, time management, and collaboration skills of the junior scholars, as well as their ability to think outside of academia.
